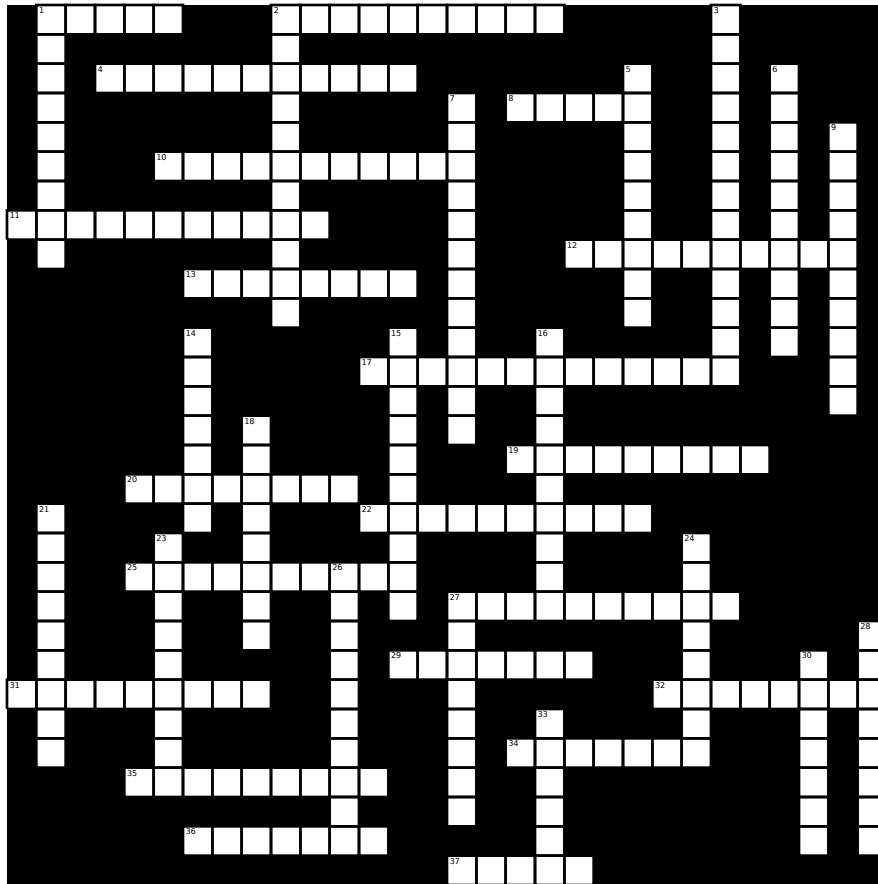

- 1 innocent or simple, showing a lack of experience, wisdom, or judgment; believe in whatever they are told.
- 2 when you look at things in a new way because of a realization that opens your eyes.
- 4 a feeling of fear that causes you to hesitate because you think something bad or unpleasant is going to happen.
- 8 sly or cunning intelligence used in a clever and usually dishonest manner to achieve something.
- 10 a thing or action that is vile and hated, or is looked upon with disgust or horror
- 11 very willing or too willing to obey someone else; to obey others unquestioningly.
- 12 To make a bad or unsatisfactory situation or problem better.
- 13 to express disapproval of, criticism of, or disappointment in someone
- 17 Describing behavior or an attitude with no pity or sympathy for others, acting with no regret or guilt; heartlessly.
- 19 To have made someone unable to think clearly; to have confused, perplexed the person.
- 20 The study of the nature of God, God's relation to the world, religious belief, faith, practice, and experiences.
- 22 Testimony from a witness which is put in writing, for use in a court of law.
- 25 showing a desire to hurt someone who has hurt or caused problems for you; to be inclined to look for revenge.
- 27 something very big or powerful, or extraordinary; remarkably great in extent, size, or degree.
- 29 a contradiction that reveals a truth; it is a statement that appears to be self-contradictory or silly but is actually not. A paradox is often used to make someone think over an idea in an innovative way.
- 31 To make someone or something weaker or less effective, often in a subtle or sneaky way.
- 32 to publicly state that someone or something is bad or wrong; to speak out against something.
- 34 telling a lie in a court of law after promising to tell the truth.
- 35 behavior meant to show respect for someone or submission to someone
- 36 when there is internal conflict within an organization, a small group separating itself from a larger one to form their own dissenting group
- 37 extremely thin and bony; haggard and drawn, as from great hunger, weariness.

- 1 well known, most likely for some bad quality or deed.
- 2 opposed to big changes, or having an intense conservative viewpoint.
- 3 expressive of disbelief and skepticism
- 5 describes someone who acts in a cruel, heartless way.
- 6 describes something that causes fear and is difficult to overcome; impressively large, powerful, intense, and/or very capable.
- 7 Describes a feeling of deep hatred or disapproval; describes a scornful or disrespectful attitude.
- 9 the act of using force to control someone or something; the state of being controlled by force
- 14 to give power or authority to someone; especially legal power or official authority.
- 15 to be puzzled or confused by something
- 16 to have behaved toward an individual or group with hostility, and treated the individual or group cruelly; most often because of their race, political or religious beliefs.
- 18 having false or unrealistic beliefs or opinions
- 21 the act of doing something to hurt someone because that person did something that hurt you or someone else; you want some type of payback in order to settle the score.
- 23 to hide under a false appearance, to deceive; when someone is being dishonest about the true motives.

- 26 Latin for "by the fact itself"; it can be rephrased as 'because of that fact or act'
- 27 supporters of a person, group, party, or cause, especially supporters who show a biased, emotional allegiance.
- 28 the set of ideas and beliefs of a group or political party; a set of ideas that characterize a particular culture.
- 30 social disorder because there is no effective form of government to control the people through rules or laws
- 33 To signal someone to approach by a gesture of the head or hand.
